Mistra Arctic Futures in a Global Context

Mistra Arctic Futures in a Global Context, the first Swedish research programme of its kind, includes five research projects which explore the changing Arctic from different angles. Whilst the focus areas of the different projects range from a variety of topics: economics, tourism, game theory, management of natural resources and social development; they are all linked by their common circumpolar focus.

Each project will be presented at the symposium 'Arctic Futures: increasing knowledge in the social sciences and humanities', followed by a stakeholder panel to discuss how the findings of the projects relate to the key issues identified by the stakeholders for their development in the Arctic region.
